There is wildlife in close-up all year round with iridescent kingfisher, dazzling dragonflies and colourful ducks. They also have a new menu, which includes filled sandwiches, hot sausage rolls and slices, plus all the regular snacks and drinks. A great place to visit for all the family!

DID YOU KNOW: About STONE CURLEWS?
Camouflage and secrecy are the stone-curlews'
natural defence and the nesting birds, eggs and
chicks are all but invisible.

Adult birds can be disturbed by human presence as much as a third of a mile away, and have usually crept silently out of sight before being noticed. Chicks hide by lying flat and motionless on the ground. The main predator, particularly of nests and young, is foxes. When nesting on arable land, nests may fail due to accidental destruction by farm machinery or the crop becoming too tall and dense, unless they are protected.

Stone-curlews are mainly active at night, when they feed on invertebrates such as ground beetles and worms.

They have large yellow eyes which point slightly downwards to help them hunt. For this reason they've been nicknamed the "goggle-eyed plover". They also occasionally take larger prey such as small rodents and chicks of other species.

The male bird usually returns to within 9 miles of their hatching site. In early spring the males' eerie curlew-like calls can be heard at night near to their breeding grounds, hence another nickname "wailing heath chicken".

Birds are usually monogamous with pairs forming strong bonds before breeding. There have been some instances of males pairing with two females, usually switching during the breeding season.

Stone-curlews nest on open, bare ground within short, semi-natural grass heath or downland, and on arable fields, typically associated with chalky and sandy soils in the south and east of the UK, where they are at the most northerly point of their range.

The nest is a simple scrape, lined with small stones, shells, rabbit droppings or pieces of vegetation. Two medium-sized eggs are laid from April onwards. They can range in colour from cream to buff with varying degrees of dark brown streaks or marks. The chicks normally hatch after 26 days, leaving the nest within two days. Both parents bring food and remain with the chicks until they fledge at between 36 and 42 days.

They are double-brooded but normally only one brood is now raised, possibly due to lack of available late nesting habitat. Second broods were once more common.


After breeding and before their southbound migration, juveniles and adult birds gather together in post breeding roosts of up to a hundred or more individuals.

In October and November, they start to leave for warmer climates in southern Spain and northern Africa where they will spend the winter. They usually return again in mid March.

#### **Stamppot**

A typical Dutch dish is "Stamppot" it comes in lots of variations but this one might just be the easiest and nicest one.

What you need:

potatoes

carrots

ratio potato 60% to carrot 40%

(amounts to suit your family)

2 large onions

bacon pieces (little squares)

and if you like, a nice pre-cooked sausage the one like a horse shaped shoe

- Peel and cut the potatoes and place them in a saucepan, clean and cut the carrots and place them on top of the potatoes
- 2. Peel and slice the onions then place them on top of the carrots
- 3. Add water so that the carrots are almost under water.
- 4. Put the pre-cooked sausage on top of everything and boil for 20 min.
- 5. When the carrots and potatoes are cooked, drain and mash. Add pepper to taste
- 6. Meanwhile bake the bacon bits until the are nice and crispy
- 7. Mix the bacon (including the fat) with the mash (no salt needed as the bacon is salty enough)
- 8. If using the Sausage, slice and serve on the side, enjoy! Many thanks to Jeanette for this lovely recipe.

Originating in the 1600s, Stamppot is one of the oldest Dutch recipes that remains popular today. The traditional Dutch Stamppot recipes use mashed potatoes as the base, and then incorporate a vegetable (often sauerkraut, kale, endive, spinach, and carrots) and sometimes a meat, the quintessential comfort food dish. There are no real rules about what goes into a Stamppot, though, so the variety is as endless as your imagination. Stamppot is a winter dish, perfect to fill up the potato farmers during harvest.


