DOG FOULING ON THE PLAYING FIELD Please keep the playing field and the surrounding area clean and pleasant to use, clean up your dogs mess! If you know who is allowing their dog to foul the playing field please contact the number below.

It is estimated that 24% of UK households own a dog and although the majority of these dog owners are responsible there are still those that don't and won't bag it and bin it! Dog mess is a nuisance and is associated with various diseases including toxocara canis which is a roundworm whose eggs can be found in dog mess.

This causes stomach upsets, sore throats, asthma and in rare cases blindness. When irresponsible dog owners do not clear up not only are they committing an offence but they are leaving behind something which can be easily picked up by young children or stood in by others. Unfortunately it is difficult to catch dog owners not clearing up, however across West Suffolk several initiatives have been implemented which aim to change this behaviour. If you are a dog owner or walker then you must pick up your dog's mess if it fouls in areas open to the public. This is a legal requirement as described under the Public Spaces Protection Order (Dogs) 2017 (refer to this for exceptions to picking up dog foul). If you do not, then you may be issued with a Fixed Penalty Notice. If you do not pay the Fixed Penalty Notice then you could be taken to court and fined up to £1,000.

To report dog foul that needs clearing or if you have witnessed dog fouling and are willing to provide a witness statement please call Customer Services on

### Creamy Smoked Bacon & Leek Risotto

4 smoked streaky bacon rashers, chopped Rapeseed oil for frying Large handful fresh sage leaves 1 large leek, finely sliced 2 garlic cloves, crushed 250g Arborio risotto rice 150ml dry white wine 750ml hot vegetable stock 80g soft goat's cheese

- Heat the oven to 200°C/180°C fan/gas 6. Heat 2 tbsp oil in a pan over a medium heat, then fry the sage until crisp. Set aside on a plate and tip out half the oil. Fry the bacon over a medium heat until crisp on both sides. Set half aside with the sage.
  - Add the leek to the rest of the bacon in the pan and cook for 5 minutes until softened and lightly browned. Add the garlic and cook for 1 minute, then stir in the rice and turn up the heat slightly. Add the wine and let it bubble. When the wine has reduced by half, stir in the stock, then transfer to a baking dish with a tight - fitting lid and cook with the lid on for 20 minutes or until the rice is tender but still has bite and the stock is absorbed.

Stir in the most of the goat's cheese until melted, then serve the risotto with the remaining bacon, cheese and sage scattered on top. Serves 4 - enjoy !



### Business Burglaries - Suffolk wide

There has been a recent increase in the number of break-ins at businesses within Suffolk and around the local region. In order to reduce the risk of burglary at your business, please note the following crime reduction points.

Do you have a (written) procedure to ensure that the building is always secure, especially when unoccupied and are all staff aware of these procedures? This should include a reminder to check all windows, doors, including fire doors are secure and that the alarm has been set.

Can you secure the perimeter of your premises, especially at the rear? A number of burglaries have occurred through offenders accessing the fire doors. Are (vulnerable) doors and windows, especially those out of view, covered by sturdy shutters or grilles? Are the loading area shutters sturdy and secure? It is always advisable to place security grilles/bars over skylights.

Have you checked your CCTV recently to ensure that it is working, the lenses are clean and the images free from obstacles that could obscure viewing, in order to provide images that allow the opportunity for identification/prosecution, from all main areas? If your CCTV is hardwired in and has hard disc drives, are they hidden away and secured so that offenders cannot take them with them, along with evidence of their being on site. Is your alarm/CCTV monitored? How long could someone be in the building prior to activating the alarm, bearing in mind that attacks may be made through the shell or roof of the building? Be aware that some offenders will test a building's security by deliberately setting off an alarm to check on how long a key holder's response time is. All activations should be taken seriously. Have you considered higher levels of security such as fogging devices, roof grilles and roof alarms?

Do you have steps in place to restrict easy access to the building roof? Such as anti-climb paint, or hostile toppings.

If you have had to let an employee go for whatever reason, have they returned all their keys, or other access materials and have you changed security codes to make sure ex-employees will no longer have access?

A number of business thefts often occur by offenders going through a main wall, or roller door using equipment to cut a hole. As a result, it is strongly advised that further security measures are incorporated. Fogging devices that will immediately fill the area with smoke disorientate and distract offenders are a really good security measure. As are security bollards or security planters. When looking for security products it is always advisable to check that the product has a security rating, that lists the time the product can withstand certain types of attack, SR8 has been tested to provide resistance of up to 20 minutes of constant force. #### The British Deer Society

Six species of deer live freely in our countryside. Only Red deer and Roe deer are truly indigenous. Fallow deer were almost certainly introduced by the Normans while three Asiatic species, Reeves' muntjac, Chinese water deer and Sika deer arrived in the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

The characteristics of each species make them well-suited to the habitats found across Britain and highly adaptable to environmental changes. Together they make a valuable contribution to biodiversity and are some of our most engaging British mammals.

Confusingly, the gender & offspring of deer species in the UK have different names !


