Suffolk Constabulary's Rural Policing Team, working together with other police forces across the Eastern region in Operation Galileo, had a successful day of action highlighting and disrupting rural crime, focusing on hare-coursing.

The rural team were joined by additional officers and also a police volunteer on 14th September for a proactive day of enforcement against hare-coursers. Using intelligence and information from the Automatic Number Plate Recognition (ANPR) system officers were able to target specific vehicles known to be used by offenders for hare-coursing. A new all-terrain vehicle (ATV), both marked and unmarked vehicles, as well as a drone were used during the operation.

A number of vehicles were stopped as a result and the occupants spoken to. Two people were reported for various offences in connection with the carriage of scrap metal. In addition several reports of people trespassing on land with dogs were investigated but found to be legitimate dogs walkers.

Following reports that some youths on mini motorbikes were riding on footpaths and were engaged in anti-social behaviour, having previously chased sheep, officers seized two mini motorbikes and reported the riders to be summoned to court.

Police and Crime Commissioner Tim Passmore said, "Well done to everyone involved in this day of action focused on hare-coursing. Suffolk is particularly vulnerable to this type of crime due to our big open spaces and population of brown hares, so it is very important to make it clear that this despicable behaviour will not be tolerated in Suffolk".

Nick Stonehouse, Head of the Rural Policing Team said, "It was a successful day and while there were no reports of hare-coursing that day, this may well be due to the overt presence of officers in marked rural vehicles deterring offenders. I would ask to the public to assist us by reporting suspicious activity in the countryside by calling police on 101. If a crime is in progress call 999".

Butternut Squash Soup with Crisps

1 butternut squash 2 tbsp olive oil 1 onion, chopped butter, to taste 600ml/20fl oz vegetable stock, (plus additional stock to thin soup if desired) 1 heaped tsp hot smoked paprika salt and freshly ground black pepper



For the crisps reserved butternut squash peelings drizzle olive oil few drops sherry vinegar 2 tbsp finely chopped rosemary

1. Peel the butternut squash and reserve the long strips of skin.

2. Discard the butternut squash pulp and chop the remaining butternut squash into chunks.

3. Heat the olive oil in a large casserole, add the onion and butternut squash and plenty of butter (to taste) and cook until brown and caramelised.

3. Pour over the stock. Simmer for 20 minutes. Remove from the heat, leave to cool slightly and then blend using a food processor or hand-blender until smooth.

4. Add the hot smoked paprika and season to taste with salt and freshly ground black pepper.

For the crisps, preheat the oven to 140C/275F/ Gas 1.

1. Place the reserved butternut peelings in a roasting tray and top with the olive oil, sherry vinegar, chopped rosemary and put in the oven to cook for 20 minutes on a low heat to crisp up.

2. Remove the crisps from the oven and place on kitchen paper to absorb any excess oil. Serve the soup with the skin crisps. Enjoy !

HALLOWEEN - DID YOU KNOW ?

The word "witch" comes from the Old English wicce, meaning "wise woman." In fact, wiccan were highly respected people at one time. According to popular belief, witches held one of their two main meetings, or sabbats, on Halloween night.

Samhainophobia is the fear of Halloween.

The owl is a popular Halloween image. In Medieval Europe, owls were thought to be witches, and to hear an owl's call meant someone was about to die

The largest pumpkin ever measured was a world record in 1993 with a 836 lb. pumpkin.

Halloween was influenced by the ancient Roman festival Pomona, which celebrated the harvest goddess of the same name. Many Halloween customs and games that feature apples (such as bobbing for apples) and nuts date from this time.

During the pre-Halloween celebration of Samhain, bonfires were lit to ensure the sun would return after the long, hard winter. Often Druid priests would throw the bones of cattle into the flames and, hence, "bone fire" became "bonfire."

Halloween is thought to have originated around 4000 B.C., which means Halloween has been around for over 6,000 years.

Scarecrows, a popular Halloween fixture, symbolize the ancient agricultural roots of the holiday.

OCTOBER GARDENING TIPS

Although we had some warmer days over September, the Autumn is now definitely here for real, and it feels colder. It's a beautiful time of year, with the trees changing colour. Sometimes it may seem pointless raking, when the wind blows even more leaves onto the lawn, but just think of all the lovely leaf mould you can make! It's also time to start preparing for early frosts.

1. Divide established rhubarb crowns to create new plants

- 2. Cut back perennials that have died down
- 3. Divide herbaceous perennials

4. Move tender plants, including aquatic ones, into a greenhouse or conservatory

- 5. Plant out spring cabbages
- 6. Harvest apples, pears, grapes and nuts
- 7. Prune climbing roses

9. Last chance to mow lawns and trim hedges in mild areas

10. Renovate old lawns or create new grass areas by laying turf.

^{8.} Finish collecting seeds from the garden to sow next year
