The Easter Weekend will soon be here and there's lots to see and do as well in our County; from country homes and gardens to explore, exhibitions and museums to visit, live music and theatre to watch, great places to eat. Bury St Edmunds is steeped in history, you can learn about the town's fascinating past on one of the town tours. During the 90 minute tour you can discover the legend of St Edmund and the wolf, Bury St Edmunds' connections to the Magna Carta, where Charles Dickens stayed, and the final resting place of a French Queen and Henry VIII's beloved sister.

> Also pay a visit to Moyse's Hall Museum which houses a number of fascinating collections and exhibitions with everything from the Abbey of Edmund to prison paraphernalia, plus remarkable collections relating to the notorious Red Barn Murder and fascinating insights into

> > local superstitions and witchcraft.

For an interactive history experience, make sure you pay a visit to West Stow Anglo Village. Over the weekend (31st March – 2nd April) there will medieval re-enactments, of crafts demonstrations and striking, illuminating including coin manuscripts and weapons and armour maintenance. Fast forward a few years and step back in

time to the Tudor period at Kentwell Hall. During the Easter weekend you will find over 100 Tudors wandering around the Manor and gardens

carrying out various everyday activities as if they were in

the year 1594.

Also in Bury St Edmunds you can stroll though the beautiful Abbey Gardens; strolling through the Appleby Rose Garden, Pilgrims Herb Garden, Sensory Garden and Rose Garden. Join one of the Cathedral tower tours where at the top, you will see magnificent panoramic views of the surrounding Suffolk countryside.

Pay a visit to Nowton Park and take a walk down The Lime Avenue; one of the finest examples in the UK which was planted around 1880 to give the estate a sense

of grandeur. At Easter you will be greeted with over 100,000 daffodils blooming beneath the trees and many visiting birds on the feeding station at the edge of the wood. If you like getting a bit wet and muddy, then the outdoor experiences from Explore 4x4. On the Elveden Estate you can try your hard at 4x4 off road driving, clay pigeon shooting, archery and crossbows. Lots to do over the Easter weekend - Have fun!

Police are warning members of the public to be vigilant after a woman was targeted by a telephone scam. On Thursday 28 December the woman received a telephone call from a man claiming he was from Virgin Money. He persuaded her to give him her bank details over the phone and then instructed her to transfer £1,700 over the phone, which she duly did. Please be vigilant !

Please remember the following: Your bank or the police will never ask you to withdraw money or purchase items.

Your bank or the police will never ask for your PIN, bank card or bank account details over the phone – never give these details out.

If you receive such a call leave the landline for at least five minutes to make an outside call. Fraudsters will keep the line open and have been known to play ring tones, hold music and a recorded message down the phone so the victim believes they are making a call to a legitimate number, use a friend or neighbour's telephone instead.

Friends, family, carers and neighbours are asked to spread the word to ensure everyone is aware of this scam and what they should do.

<u>Bumblebee Auctions</u> is the national police website that sells lost or stolen items that can't be reunited with their rightful owners. The website allows members of the public to view and bid for various items being sold by police forces around the UK, such as bikes, jewellery, tools, photographic equipment, clothing and much more. The money generated through these sales is put back into the community by financially supporting local charities and organisations.

This is done via the Safer Suffolk Fund which improves the quality of life for those that live, work, travel, and invest in Suffolk. Visit their website to view items for sale from Suffolk Police and other forces. Items for sale on Bumblebee Auctions change on a daily basis, so it's worth keeping an eye on the items available for sale.

SPICED BRIOCHE AND RHUBARB PUDDING

400g ready-sliced brioche loaf
80g butter, softened, plus extra to grease the dish
500ml jersey or whole milk
4 medium free-range eggs
50g golden caster sugar
1 tsp vanilla bean paste or extract
2 tbsp demerara sugar

For the rhubarb - 400g rhubarb, cut into 2cm chunks ½ tsp ground allspice
½ tsp ground cinnamon
¼ tsp freshly grated nutmeg
30g butter, cubed
50g light brown soft sugar
Grated zest and juice 1 orange

- 1. Heat the oven to 180°C/160°fan/gas 4. Toss the rhubarb in a roasting tin with the spices, butter, sugar, zest and juice. Roast for 20 minutes until sticky and caramelised. Set aside to cool.
- 2. Spread the brioche with the butter. Cut into triangles and layer up in a prepared baking dish (1.5 litre ovenproof baking dish, lightly greased) with two thirds of the rhubarb (set aside the rest).
- 3. In a jug, mix the milk, eggs, caster sugar and vanilla. Pour two thirds over the brioche, then set aside to soak. Just before baking, pour the rest over and top with the reserved rhubarb and the demerara sugar.
- 4. Bake for 30-40 minutes until golden brown and the custard has set around the edges. Serve with clotted cream, ice cream or custard.

A chocolate one!




