Police are warning farmers or smallholdings with livestock to be vigilant to suspicious activity as officers believe offenders, who slaughtered sheep on two previous occasions, may still be operating in Suffolk.

The first discovery was made in 23 December in Sproughton by the owner who found the remains of one of the sheep by a stream. The carcass had been taken, leaving the remainder of the animal behind.

The second incident happened between Wednesday 21 February and Thursday 22 February, when an unknown offender had cut the throats of three sheep that were grazing in a field situated near Chelmondiston, before removing the carcasses and leaving them in a small wooded area next to the field where two of three sheep were also left partially skinned.

Yesterday, Monday 9 April, officers recovered a bag close to a flock of sheep and believe the contents within may be linked to this type of illegal activity.

Anyone living in areas where sheep graze should report any out of the ordinary activity such as individuals handling livestock. Members of the public should also be mindful of being offered meat for sale in suspicious circumstances.

To report anything suspicious contact Suffolk police on 101

Police are urging caravan owners to take simple steps to secure their caravans.

Sgt Brian Calver from the Rural Crime Team police said: "As we enter spring time it's the time of year when more caravans are going to be used so I would urge users/owners to be vigilant.

"My advice for owners would be to ensure the caravan is kept locked and secured by a decent lock which is 'Secure by Design' rated. People should also ensure security markings are recorded and photos of the caravan taken. If possible, they should park them under lit areas and consider CCTV.

"I would strongly urge all owners to have tracking devices fitted, as these can result in prompt recovery, which was the case for the one stolen last week. The cost of a tracking device can easily be balanced against the cost of a replacement caravan."

Other useful tips to consider include:

Use locking wheel nuts and a good quality clamp on the wheels

Not to leave expensive personal belongings inside and ensure they lock them on site when out for the day also. If out for the evening, consider leaving a light and or radio on, to make the place look occupied.

Consider the use of shed alarms which are relatively inexpensive easily available at hard ware stores yet provide a good deterrent.

Site owners, are urged to review their site security and consider such things as CCTV, barriers, lighting, ditches around the perimeter to prevent access via fields, regular patrols around the site, particularly after dark to ensure security is maintained. If anybody wants any advice on security for their site, they can contact me or any caravan dealership where they will be able to advise accordingly.

LONG BOWS AT WEST STOW -If you've never tried archery with a long bow I can recommend it!

My son was surprised to hear, when he came to visit me, that he was booked onto a Long Bow Experience at the Anglo-Saxon Village on Easter Saturday morning. I went along as photographer and prayed the rain would hold off for the hour in question. My prayer was answered, and for an hour and a half, the tutor instructed the 6 eager recruits beneath dark clouds but no rain.

It was fun but quite challenging and you felt the 'archers shoulder' the next day I was told!

These long bows are as tall as a person and can reach hundreds of yards if fired correctly. The archers were directed to lean forward in a fierce, aggressive manner and they would have been a formidable foe, when highly trained. Historically, every town had their 'butts' area, every grown man had to by law practice archery every week so that they were ready when called to fight. Later we warmed up in the café and laughed about the ones that didn't reach the target! Karen Nolan.

Strawberry and Malted Milk Layer Cake

345 gms Plain Flour 15gms Baking Powder 75 gms Ground Almonds 225 gms Unsalted Butter plus extra to grease 260 gms Golden Caster Sugar plus 3 tbsp 4 Medium Eggs 5 ml Madagascan Vanilla Extract 7 tablespoons Malted Drink Powder 225 ml Milk 450 q Strawberries 400 ml Double Cream Mini Wafer Flowers & Thyme Leaves to decorate

- 1. Heat the oven to 170C, 150C fan, gas 3. Grease 3 x 18cm cake tins and double line the bases sides with baking parchment. Mix the flour, baking powder and ground almonds in a bowl, leave aside.
- 2. Beat the butter and 260g of the sugar until creamy and pale, gradually beat in the eggs then mix in the vanilla extract and 3tbsp of the malted drink powder. Fold in the flour mixture, followed by the milk. Divide between the three tins, smoothing the tops. Bake in the oven (lower shelf) for 25-35 mins or until an inserted skewer comes out clean. Once cool enough to handle remove from the tins to a wire rack to cool completely.
- 3. Meanwhile roughly chop and put 100g of the strawberries in a small saucepan along with the remaining 3tbls of sugar, roughly mash with a potato masher then set over a medium heat, bubble for a few mins until syrupy. Pass through a sieve discarding the pulp. Leave the syrup to cool then roughly chop 175g of the strawberries and mix in the syrup.

Half the remaining large strawberries and leave smaller ones whole to decorate the top.

4. Whisk the cream with the rest of the malt extract until holding its shape. Put one of the sponges on a serving plate, spread over a third of the malted cream and half the chopped strawberries and some of the syrup then top with another sponge, and add repeat the decoration. Set the last sponge on top then spread with the remaining cream and halved and whole strawberries, drizzle over a little more syrup. Add the thyme leaves and mini wafer flowers. ENJOY a summer treat!


